# Minister's Message

One of the problems that I have had at Trinity is filling all of the bookshelves. My office came with three great units, but especially when I first started there was no way I was going to be able to fill them all. I brought a lot of decorations and even some fiction titles that *might* be relevant to something I end up doing in ministry just to make the place seem a little fuller. As much as it is not that important, the look and feel of full book shelves is nice. I can remember offices of others ministers that I have been in and always felt full and satisfied looking at full shelves. And yet, I did not want to just go out and get books for the sake of it. Each book I have held onto has a specific purpose and role and history, and I appreciate the pruning of things I am never going to use or reference or enjoy again. You may have noticed a contradiction. Here I am at cross-purposes, desiring a robust collection of impressive tomes but also understanding that it is not a practical goal. Am I yearning to feel wiser and more accomplished through appearances? Am I losing out on good information when I set aside books to which I no longer feel connected?

This is not the first book collection I have ever had. When I was younger and shared a book collection with my brother and sister, we had an expanding collection. We had a set of bookshelves that were nearly always full as we collected and preserved books from years past alongside new acquisitions. Whether it was our (nearly) complete series of Redwall novels, the classics our




uncle gave us one holiday, or the nature and science books that populated our non-fiction shelves, each book was part of a living record. They each spoke of the times and places in our lives when they were purchased or received, or the times in which we grew into being able to read them. At a certain point we were not really giving the books away. They could still be read and enjoyed, and even if they couldn't they still looked nice on the shelves. I have fragments of that collection still with me, since the collection was divided between us and a donation bin when it came time for the shelves to be cleared off.

God is actively working in our lives and books are a nice metaphor for that process. Sometimes the right book comes into our hands at the right time, and sometimes there is a moment in which it needs to be given away: we can trust that we are receiving what we need when we need it. These lives, after all, are an accumulation of the people and places that have touched us, and the filled (or unfilled) shelves in our lives symbolize some of the things that are important to us, whether that is because of the contents of the book or where it came from. If we believe that God is guiding us to the things and people we need to live and flourish in this life, the number of books in one's collection is not important. The journey that led to the collection in its current, perfect iteration is a reflection of our search for knowledge, the joy of connection, and the transformative power of story. Whether our collection rivals a library or is only a single volume, it still says something about us and where we have been. As I seek to arrange my office shelves in a way that brings me greater peace, may we all take this season of starting up and getting going to do something that brings us back in touch with our own story. Sometimes there isn't anything we can do when a shelf is empty or overflowing. But where we can, may we honour ourselves and what we need and strike the right balance to bring us peace.

## Bobby Cloutier Memorial Golf Tournament


On June 25, after a long hiatus due to the Covid 19 epidemic, we were finally able to once again hold our golf tournament, which has always been one of Trinity's major fund raisers. In fact, this is the first time we have been able to hold the tournament which we decided to name in memory of Bobby who was a long-time member of

Trinity as well as a choir member and an outfielder of the former Trinity Trihards softball ream.

Linda and I want to sincerely thank Ellen MacLean for her help in reaching out to so many of Bobby's friends who have always supported our tournament in the past.

This was a first for many reasons. Firstly because of the name change and new dedication.

Secondly because it is now an 18-hole event instead of a 9-hole event and lastly because we were unable to have an organized meal afterwards because we could not arrange for a shot gun start.



We had a total of **57 people** take part in the tournament. The winners with a score of eight under par were Bill Russell, Wendell Stanley, Rick Wilson and Peter Basran.

In addition to the silent auction which netted almost \$1,600, we also had 13 people sponsor a hole at \$100 per hole. All of this coupled with a small markup on the actual cost to the players to participate in the tournament, we were able to net a total profit of **\$3,906.22** after expenses.

In addition to Ellen, we want to thank everyone who turned out to play golf, those nongolfers who joined us for a drink and something to eat, everyone who sponsored a hole and certainly everyone who donated items for the silent auction and/or prizes for players. What's better than that?


