

# <u>Minister's Message</u>

Friends, will this truly be the first Easter I spend worshiping at Trinity?

It seems strange to say but despite the fact that I have been here for a few years I have yet to spend Easter in person at the church with other people there. For the last two years, the pandemic has prevented this from occurring. As one of the high holidays (perhaps the highest, arguably) it has been a pretty large hole in these past two years, like we never truly finished what we had started, we never completed a full year of the church. Not like how I had kind of envisioned. But it seems like things are starting to take a bit of a turn and for this spring at least, I may finally get some of the vision that I had hoped for coming to fruition.

In some ways these past two years have been a little bit of storage. This is to say, I think I have been putting away ideas and tasks that didn't seem feasible or necessary but now it is starting to be the time to unpack all of these metaphorical boxes. And actual boxes. The main storage closet in my apartment has a top shelf that has a number of things on it that I do not need, but didn't want to deal with. When I initially moved in January 2020, a few months before the start of the pandemic, that shelf was basically empty. But then, if there was something I didn't want to deal with, it went up there and the door was closed. But now I've started to take down the bag of clothes I wanted to donate, rearranged my Christmas decoration storage, looked at the floor mats from my last car with consideration and decided I wasn't ready to try to find a new owner for them. Each of these things was some kind of message from the past of a person who was not in the head space to confront that particular task. Now, in this season of new life, maybe I am. Getting that bag of clothes out of my life was probably one of my biggest mental health victories of the past five years.

It isn't right for me to do a full pandemic retrospective quite yet because we are still very much in the midst of it and the exact path we are going to take in these next months and years is still uncertain. Even though things are, legally speaking, becoming a little bit more possible in general, we should stay aware that not all of us are comfortable or able to feel at peace with this sense of possibility I've described. Though I am still trying to be cautious myself, I do feel a little lighter than I have, even in previous times of loosening restrictions. This being the most hopeful spring in a while is maybe giving me a little more energy and a little

more hope. Wherever you can find it in this time, even if it has reservations, I hope that you can find a little bit of hope, a little bit of renewal. Do not be afraid to take care of yourself and, if you need it, take this as a sign to take that little burdensome thing out of your life as soon as you are able to do so. You deserve it.

When you read this, say a prayer, and maybe, just maybe, we can get the world to start thinking of who took our place.






